President's Greetings

Recently I learned that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has established 27 different kinds of nonprofits and that 1.5 million of these entities are registered nationwide. I also learned that the Friends of Freedom Public Library, Inc. is a particular type of non-profit with a key characteristic that contributes to its success and benefits its members in a remarkable way.

The key characteristic of our Friends group is that we are an all-volunteer organization. While it is true that from time to time we hire people to help us with our projects—labor to move books, newspaper ad writers, speakers and other presenters—we do not hire anyone to run our operations or govern us. We, ourselves, determine how we will accomplish our mission and what our responsibilities and procedures will be.

This all-volunteer approach produces the energy that makes us successful. Our active members work faithfully within our group because they believe in our core values: Friendship, Promoting Literacy, Community Outreach and Continuous Improvement. They have chosen the Freedom Friends because our work aligns with their beliefs. While we always need to build consensus around major initiatives, that consensus is usually reached efficiently because of our shared core values.

Our all-volunteer approach can benefit each of us who is actively involved in another, truly amazing way. A 2017 Mayo Clinic study found that senior volunteering:

- -- Decreases the risk of depression
- --Gives volunteers a sense of purpose
- -- Teaches valuable skills
- --Increases mental and physical activity
- --Helps reduce stress
- -- May lengthen life

Of the more than 200 Friends in our group approximately 30 are active members who volunteer two or more hours a week. It would be wonderful in many ways if 30 more of our members would become active implementers of our mission and reap the benefits of volunteering!

In response to these concerns, the Friends of Freedom Public Library have set aside close to \$14,000 to cover the cost of renovating this work space. New furniture, carpeting and careful re-routing of paths for the constant transfer of books to and from other branch libraries will reduce clutter and increase safety and efficiency.

A local office supply company has drawn up comprehensive plans for the renovation. Work should begin within the next six weeks. When the renovation is complete, this column will proudly display "After" pictures. Library staff, Friends and patrons can then celebrate this improvement in library facilities.
